The program, which is funded by the N.C. Council on Developmental Disabilities and The Department of Health and Human Services' Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services, seeks to teach job skills to students

who have developmental disabilities with the goal of enabling them to become productively employed.

According to the Project SEARCH website, "The sole definition of a successful outcome is competitive employment in an integrated setting for each Project SEARCH intern." On a national level, according to the Project SEARCH organization, about one quarter of those who complete internships are hired by the host organization where they have done their training. The expectation is that other program completers will be able to find employment in other community organizations where they can utilize the skills they have learned.

The program emphasizes a "total immersion" experience where the interns are at the job site for the full day. Students typically spent one to two hours each day working on employable skills

intern then spent four to five
hours each day working at
various positions in the organization hosting the program
— Southeastern Health.

Participants in the program worked in the Education Department, food services, pre-registration, guest services, same-day surgery, laboratories and other areas on the hospital's main campus and at the Community Health and Education Center inside Biggs Park Mall. They learned various skills such as greeting visitors and assisting them in finding their way around the hospital, packing food containers, collecting specimens, data entry, filling orders and stocking medicines.
